

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Designing & Glanning Your Special Day BY NISHA HALLERT

Your wedding is more than an event: It's the most important story you will ever tell. The way in which you craft your nuptials reveals who you and your partner are as a couple. Thinking of matrimony as a personal narrative with a beginning, middle, and end helps you break your Big Day into manageable pieces. This strategy enables you to plan, design, and weave your tale more easily. How will you tell your wedding story?

THE BEGINNING

From the moment you get engaged, the research begins. You may find yourself flooded with excitement ... and an overwhelming feeling of anxiety.

Venue

A venue sets the visual tone for your event. Take note of how the venue makes you feel as soon as you walk through the doors. Do you want your wedding to evoke the comfort of Grandma's house? If so, a quaint bed and breakfast or cabin near your favorite lake might be the answer. A venue with a view can help ease the decoration budget—you're substituting décor with vista. Full-service venues that provide tables and chairs as well as setup and teardown will be less stressful and ultimately better for your budget. Destination weddings are still hot this year, as are creative ceremonies with a twist, such as spiral ceremony setups, in which the aisle and seats on either side are arranged in a spiral.

Color and design

Color plays a major role in any wedding, evoking emotion and painting a picture for you and your guests. The color story extends throughout the entire process, from the invitations to makeup, bridesmaids' dresses, flowers, lighting, décor, and even food and drink. You can transform your venue into your dream destination through the effective use of colors and design accents, for instance by using different shades of blue, such as turquoise and teal with cobalt, then adding in bright green with coral accents. This color combination transports your party to a tropical paradise while remaining stateside.

The design aesthetic you choose also helps tell your wedding story, and flowers are a big part of that



Maybe you lean toward organic and natural. Using unusual greens for your centerpieces helps achieve this look. Have you ever wondered why sunset weddings are so popular? The answer is lighting. Lighting helps enrich an event and provides a way to change the mood and environment. A sunset, one of Mother Nature's most precious gifts, creates a priceless, everlasting feeling. You can create that same sunset ambience that will last your entire event by using uplights that wash an area of the room with light. Uplighting can evolve as your event does. The ceremony could start with a romantic lighting palette and change as the evening progresses to match the vibe, similar to a DJ creating moods with music. Image mapping also allows you to create any desired environment by projecting images onto surfaces or producing creative light shows. Do you want your guests to feel as if they're floating on clouds? Image mapping can do that.



Food and beverages

We are lucky to live in a region where we have access to some of the freshest produce, meats and seafood along with wonderful wines, handcrafted beers, and spirits. It has become the norm to include locally or regionally sourced ingredients at catered events, so if your caterer is not promoting local options, look for another vendor. Go a step further and make a



connection with the farmer, the chocolatier or the cheesemaker. Did you know it might be possible to raise a specific item just for your wedding? Weaving a favorite food into your menu is a way to help connect the dots between you, the farmer, and the story you are trying to tell. For example, if you and your partner are turophiles (cheese lovers) perhaps you'll want to curate a menu featuring cheese wheels comprised of regionally sourced cheeses or a wedding cake made of cheese wheels, which can be served as the small plate appetizers for the guests to enjoy tableside. If you're an oyster aficionado, consider an all-New Jersey oyster bar, along with tasting cards featuring the name and description of each bi-valve. It will be a good conversation starter for your guests as well as a taste of the Shore.

Entertainment

Adding an interactive element to your wedding helps make the event extra memorable. Hosting a scavenger hunt on a property while the wedding party takes photos or having an illustrator create guest portraits are popular ideas this year. Love lawn games? Create unique cornhole boards for all to enjoy. Custom Snapchat Geofilters provide an easy way to engage guests in an activity, using only their smartphones. Silent disco, in which guests dance to music that's heard via wireless headphones, is both trendy and ideal for locations that prohibit sound past a certain time. Traditional DJs and live musicians are timeless staples, but don't be afraid to ratchet up your entertainment.

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






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Wedding Trends for 2018

Décor and event design

Not every bride or groom wants to go crazy with the décor. Not every venue demands that, either. Whether you are looking to create a lush fantasy garden or a simple, sleek space, suspended arrangements and ceiling treatments are all the rage. What once was rustic is now woodsy. Use lots of greenery to create this feeling. Mono-botanical floral arrangements make any venue look contemporary this season, while cascading bouquets elevate the elegance quotient.

Elegance is the perfect word to describe the 2018 trend direction—elegant without overdone formality. Clean floral arrangements complemented by classic attire create a romantic, whimsical mood that is anything but stuffy. This trend extends to jewelry as well: Flower necklaces, especially chokers, are hot this year.

To put the finishing touches on your décor, consider adding texture details to the menus, such as marble, copper, or wax stamps. Finally, eclectic seating arrangements will set your wedding apart. Think high-top tables mixed with rounds, king tables, banquettes, and mixand-match chairs at each table.

Choosing colors

Color is about more than a palette for your party to abide by. Color sets the mood for your Big Day. Always, the colors you pick should reflect your personalities. If you worry so much about staying fashionable that you end up with colors you barely tolerate, you will regret 3 it. Being true to yourself is the biggest trend of it. Try substituting navy for black at formal events. Think blue tie instead of black tie. Metallics still are popular in 2018, with a slight shift. Brass and rose gold have replaced last year's gold. Also, silver and chrome are making a comeback.

Food selections

Ahhhh, the good stuff. Gone are the banquets of classic chicken and bland rice dishes. Everyone seems to be a foodie these days, so get creative with your menu. Unique appetiz-

ers and salads featuring seaweed and hemp have surfaced this season. If those suggestions make you squirm, have no fear.

Classic flavors also are in, with a contemporary twist. In place of spaghetti and meatballs, consider baked mini spaghetti bites topped with meat sauce. For bacon lovers (bacon always is trending!), imagine a chocolate-dipped bacon hanging from a cute, woodsy clothesline display.

Many of your guests, and much of the public, increasingly consider where their food comes from. If you serve seafood, ensure it's sustainable and think about putting up signage indicating such. Stem to stalk and nose to tail have surpassed farm to fork as the righteous food calling cards. For your non-meat-eating guests, try vegetarian variations on the classics.

Food must not only taste scrumptious, but it must look great, too. A plate of food should be designed just like a work of art. Small, composed plates comprised of bright colors and textures add pop to your party. Imagine, for instance, edible flowers on top of burrata. Interactive food stations add another festive element. Cap the soirée with creative desserts such as popsicles or ice cream sandwiches.

Approachable videography

Where once videography seemed a superfluous luxury, now the medium has become accessible and predominant. These are not the long, droll, straight videos of yesteryear. Today's wedding videos tell cinematic stories using multiple angles and quick edits. Drone video is especially popular. We can thank the Super Bowl for this trend! Drones, in particular, offer a different vantage point that traditional videography cannot achieve. A drone can take spectacular photos of the guests during the reception and ceremony. One tip: Make sure that your drone pilot carries the proper license and that your wedding venue is comfortable with the drone on site. Also, while videography is popular, I do not suggest that a video replace your still shots.

As you can see, 2018 trends exude eclectic elegance. Still, never sacrifice authenticity for fashion. 

FLOWER POWER

Rose Robson runs Robson's Farm, a 4th generation farm in Wrightstown that now places a special emphasis on flowers, including offering a Flower CSA. She has noticed a shift in what couples want on the floral front for their big day: "Many couples are returning to a more formal feel. The cascading bouquet will have a presence. On the other side of that, I think greenery is big too, almost woodsy for both their bouquet and centerpieces. In some cases, people are forgoing large table centerpieces for other elements that multipurpose. For example, a floral wall that can be behind the couple at the ceremony and move into the reception for guests to use as a photo backdrop."
